SOAP - Acupuncture Follow Up Encounter NO E/M

Acu Electa a 55years of age Female presents in the acupuncture clinic. Patient identity confirmed by name and DOB: Yes Initial visit date: 06/11/2020 Today 07/11/2020 is acupuncture encounter # 9 this year. This is session # 21 for this complaint. It has been 2 week(s) since last visit.

Cautions: Lymphedema – right arm – post mastectomy Topical Allergies reviewed: Latex/bandage Medication reviewed: Yes Current Chemotherapy, Lyrica, Oxycodone

Chief complaint(s):

- 1. feet and right-hand chronic chemo induced neuropathy
- 2. right shoulder pain

SUBJECTIVE

Acu Electa presents today in the acupuncture clinic to continue address chronic chemo induced neuropathy in right hand and both feet, that feel like "numb glove and socks", has troubles with balance while walking, and cannot button a shirt. Today neuropathy pain is 3/10.

Started 9 months ago at 7th chemo treatment for right sided E+ metastatic breast cancer. She continues to receive chemo every 2 weeks; accordingly, neuropathy aggravates dependent on chemo tx schedule. Today is day 7 after last chemo

Current and/or Prior treatment since last visit: Medication/dosage: continues Lyrica 2 times a day

Secondary complaint: right shoulder pain 3/10 – constant, hard to lift arm, worse at night *Current and/or Prior treatment:* started PT who did Dry Needling around right shoulder yesterday Medication/dosage: Oxycodone at night

Medical History Relevant to Complaint(s): Metastatic breast cancer

OBJECTIVE

Physical Exam: None Performed

Visual inspection/Observation

Discolorations: pale with dry cracking skin feet and fingertips Edema: none Ambulation/Gait: unsteady Spirit/Shen: Alert Qi: Week/low voice

Labs: None relevant since last encounter *Imaging:* None relevant since last encounter

TM Tongue: pale, thick greasy coat TM Pulse: week, slippery

ASSESSMENT

Response to the previous treatment: Patient has responded favorably to last acupuncture Tx, chronic paranesthesia pain has improved for few days after that gradually returned but with lesser intensity.

Today acupuncture treatment is based on Traditional Medicine theory: TCM Eight Principles, Microsystem.

Today treatment follows established TM strategy: treat Manifestation/Branch and Cause/Root simultaneously

The following problems are addressed at this encounter.

1.

ICD-10 Diagnosis: G63.1 Polyneuropathy in neoplastic disease *ICD-11 Chapter 26 TM pattern:* SF00 Blood deficiency pattern (TM1), SF79 Spleen deficiency with dampness accumulation pattern (TM1)

2.

ICD-10 Diagnosis: M25.511 - Pain in right shoulder, G89.3 - Neoplasm related pain (acute) (chronic) *ICD-11 Chapter 26 TM pattern:* SF01 Blood stasis pattern (TM1), SE91Qi stagnation pattern (TM1)

TM Treatment Principle: relive pain, disperse Dampness, promote smooth movement of Qi, activate Blood, tonify Spleen

PLAN OF CARE

Risk, Benefit, Alternative Personnel, Equipment, Financial Responsibilities discussed with patient. Informed Consent and Intake form located in patient file.

Counseled patient on risks of acupuncture including pain, infection, bleeding, and no relief of pain. All questions were answered. Patient verbalized understanding and agreed to begin care.

Acupuncture:

Needles Set 1, *Position*: Sited. *Style:* Tung, *Points*: Left ankle Ashi – 3 needles – manipulation and active right shoulder movement 15 minutes spent face to face time with the patient for set 1

Needles Set 2, *Position*: Supine *Style*: TCM, *Points*: Bafeng, St36, Sp10, Sp9, Sp3 12 minutes spent face to face time with the patient for set 2 # of needle inserted: 19 # of needles withdrawn: 19

TCM topicals used: Zheng Gu Shui on feet and right hand *TDP lamp applied to*: Feet

Adjunct techniques used: None *E-Steam*: Bafeng \leftarrow St36, Wave pattern set to DD (1), Frequency set to 2:0Hz, Intensity set to patient's tolerance.

Adverse Events: None, patient tolerated the procedure well.

Therapy outcomes: Symptom management

HOME GOING INSTRUCTIONS

Follow up acupuncture schedule: in 2 weeks

Ear seeds/pellets: Points left Ear – Shenmen, Shoulder and Hand. Patient was instructed to remove them after 3 days

What to expect after acupuncture:

After the removal of acupuncture needles, there may be some minor soreness, itch, little to no sensation in the treatment area. In rare occasion, there can be mild bruising/bleeding. The bruising will gradually fade away in a couple of weeks.

If you have not eaten before acupuncture, you may experience dizziness/nausea. Drink some warm fluids to help with the symptoms.

If you had acupuncture treatment for chronic pain, you may experience some ache sensation for a couple of days. This will gradually dissipate with subsequent sessions.

Acupuncture is a fairly safe procedure, but if you had needles near/around your ribcage and are experiencing any of these symptoms, contact your acupuncturist immediately:

- Sudden shortness of breath
- Increase breathing rate
- Chest pain
- Dry cough
- Bluish discoloration of the skin
- Excessive sweating that you never experience before

After acupuncture treatment, you should rest/relax for a few hours. Do not shower or get yourself wet. Avoid strenuous workouts or stressful situations. It is normal to feel tired or sleepy after the acupuncture treatment.
